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QUESTION 1

Which of the laboratory results would indicate that a patient's theophylline level is therapeutic?

- A. 5 mcg/ml
- B. 15 mcg/ml
- C. 25 mcg/ml
- D. 30 mcg/ml

Correct Answer: B

A therapeutic theophylline level is 15 mcg/ml. The normal range is 10 to 20 mcg/ml. Anything greater than 20 is considered toxic, meaning that the patient will start having side effects. Anything less than 10 indicates that the patient needs additional medication.

QUESTION 2

You are administering a Snellen chart test to a patient. What results would you expect to get if your patient was legally blind?

- A. 20/20 vision
- B. 20/40 vision
- C. 20/60 vision
- D. 20/200 vision

Correct Answer: D

The patient would be considered legally blind if the result of the Snellen chart test is 20/200 vision. This means that the patient is able to read at 20 feet what a person with normal vision can read at 200 feet. Legal blindness is defined as 20/200 or less with corrected vision or visual acuity of less than 20 degrees of the visual field in the better eye.

QUESTION 3

You are caring for a patient who has been bitten by dog. What medication do you suspect the physician will order for this patient?

- A. Tetanus vaccine
- B. Rabies vaccine
- C. Antibiotics
- D. Antivenom

Correct Answer: A



The physician will most likely order for the patient to have a tetanus vaccine. A rabies vaccine would only be given if the dog was suspected of having rabies. Antibiotics would be administered if the wound became infected, and antivenom is given for poisonous snakes and insects.

QUESTION 4

You are caring for a patient in the withdrawal process. What medication do you expect the physician to order to make the withdrawal process easier?

- A. Tetrahydrocannabinol
- B. Naltrexone hydrochloride
- C. Benzodiazepine
- D. Amphetamines

Correct Answer: C

The physician would order benzodiazepines for the patient going through the withdrawal process. The patient going through withdrawal can be anxious and agitated. Withdrawal can also lead to elevated blood pressure, heart rate and even death in some cases if not treated. Giving benzodiazepines to the patient decreases the risk of this happening.

QUESTION 5

You have delegated care of a patient in restraints to a nursing assistant. How often should the nursing assistant assess skin integrity for this patient?

- A. Every 30 minutes
- B. Every 2 hours
- C. Every 3 hours
- D. Every 4 hours

Correct Answer: A

The nursing assistant should assess the patient's skin integrity every 30 minutes for as long as the patient is in restraints. In order to delegate this task to the nursing assistant the nurse must insure that the nursing assistant is clear on what care the patient requires.

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
