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### QUESTION 1

You are caring for a child who has HIV with a positive Mantoux test. The physician orders isoniazid (INH). You instruct the child's mother that the patient will have to take the medication for how long?

- A. 4 months
- B. 6 months
- C. 9 months
- D. 12 months

Correct Answer: D

The child will need to take the medication for 12 months. A child with HIV would need to take the medication for longer to prevent latent infection from progressing to active infection. Children who are not immune compromised will need to take the drug for 2 to 4 months.

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### QUESTION 2

After a tonsillectomy, your patient begins to vomit. What intervention should be your priority?

- A. Administer an antiemetic
- B. Turn the patient to the side
- C. Notify the physician
- D. Maintain the patient's "nothing by mouth" status

Correct Answer: B

Your first priority should be to turn the patient on the side to prevent aspiration. Only then should you notify the physician. It is also important to continue to maintain the "nothing by mouth" feeding status of the patient and give antiemetic if prescribed.

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### QUESTION 3

You will be working with an unlicensed staff member this shift. Which of the following should be priority before delegating care to the staff member?

- A. Assessing whether the staff member is competent to perform the skill
- B. Preparing written instructions on how to perform skill
- C. Gathering supplies
- D. Informing the patient that an unlicensed staff member will perform the care

Correct Answer: A



The RN should assess the unlicensed staff member's competency to complete the task assigned to them before delegating. Written instructions are not necessary if the staff is competent to complete the skill. Supplies will need to be gathered once an assignment is made. The staff member performing the procedure needs to give his or her name and title to the patient before performing the task.

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#### QUESTION 4

When caring for a patient with glaucoma, which of the following symptoms would you not expect to see on the patient's chart?

- A. Severe eye pain
- B. Frequent pink-eye infections
- C. Blurred vision
- D. Nausea and vomiting

Correct Answer: B

Frequent pink-eye infections are not symptomatic of glaucoma, but reddening of the eyes is a common symptom.

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#### QUESTION 5

What is the normal intraocular pressure of the eye?

- A. 2 to 7 mm Hg
- B. 10 to 21 mm Hg
- C. 22 to 30 mm Hg
- D. 31 to 35 mm Hg

Correct Answer: B

The normal intraocular pressure of the eye is 10 to 21 mm Hg. The test used to measure intraocular pressure is called a tonometry. This is how glaucoma is diagnosed. A patient with glaucoma would have an intraocular pressure of 30 to 70 mm Hg.

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
