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### QUESTION 1

Alcohol, caffeine, or drugs are high risk factors that all fall under which broad classification of risk factors?

Correct Answer: D

Psychosocial risk factors include life style choices like the use or abuse of alcohol, caffeine and illicit drugs in addition to smoking and psychological status.

Low income, age, and ethnicity are social demographic risk factors.

Second hand smoke and air pollution are environmental risk factors; and biophysical risk factors include genetic considerations, nutritional status and disorders such as diabetes.

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### QUESTION 2

Which of these is not a stage of group therapy development?

- A. termination stage
- B. discovery stage
- C. working stage
- D. initial stage

Correct Answer: B

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### QUESTION 3

A nurse is working in a pediatric clinic and a mother brings in her 13-month-old child who has Down Syndrome. The mother reports, "My child's muscles feel weak and he isn't moving well. My RN friend check his reflexes and she said they are diminished."

Which of the following actions should the nurse take first?

- A. Contact the physician immediately
- B. Have the patient go to X-ray for a c-spine work-up.
- C. Start an IV on the patient



D. Position the child's neck in a neutral position

Correct Answer: D

An atlanto-axial dislocation may have occurred.

Position the child in a neutral c-spine posture and then contact the doctor immediately.

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#### QUESTION 4

When questioning an elder about suspected abuse, the nurse should keep the questions \_\_\_\_\_.

A. nonjudgmental

B. probing

Correct Answer: A

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#### QUESTION 5

Rh negative maternal blood indicates \_\_\_\_\_.

A. an incompatibility in the blood between the mother and fetus

B. that antibodies in the mother's blood are attacking her baby's blood

C. the mother will require a blood transfusion at the time of delivery

D. the mother does not have a specific marker on her red blood cells

Correct Answer: D

The mother's red blood cells lacking a specific marker indicate that she is Rh negative. However, incompatibility only occurs if the baby is Rh positive and the mother is Rh negative. This is typically not a problem with a first pregnancy, but in a subsequent pregnancy, the incompatibility can cause the antibodies created during the first pregnancy to attack the new fetus' red blood cells. A blood transfusion would have no effect on this problem.

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
