QUESTION 2

Which of the following routes of entry is the most common cause of anaphylactic reaction?

- A. Contact
- B. Ingestion
- C. Inhalation
- D. Injection

Correct Answer: D

Injection is the most common way an allergen will be exposed to a patient, medicine being injected by a syringe, insects stinging and animal bites

QUESTION 3

You find the following medications with your patient who is not responding to your loud verbal stimuli, glucophage and Lipitor. What is likely the patients problem?

- A. High cholesterol
- B. High blood pressure
- C. Diabetic reaction
- D. Coronary Artery Disease

Correct Answer: C

Glucophage is a diabetic medication, you may not be able to identify what type of reaction your patient is having without more diagnostic testing but it puts you looking in the correct direction. The Lipitor may come into play later on in long



term care but high cholesterol generally has not effect on mental status the way hypo or hyperglycemia will.

QUESTION 4

"You are dispatched to a 65-year old male who is complaining of severe chest pain, and has a history of cardiac problems. What is the primary role of medical direction in this scenario? "

- A. Medical direction serves no purpose
- B. Give authorization for interventions

Correct Answer: B

Medical direction's primarily role is to authorize the delivery of interventions to the patient by the EMT.

QUESTION 5

Why is it critical that the paramedic complete an equipment checklist at the beginning of each shift?

- A. Most medical insurance agencies require a copy of the checklist for ongoing liability coverage
- B. Completion reduces the risk of liability associated with providing prehospital medical services.

Correct Answer: B

Completion of an equipment/supply checklist enables the paramedic to determine the overall preparedness of the ambulance for patient care. Checklists allow the paramedic to ascertain whether all necessary supplies and equipment are present and working as well as the expiration dates on medications carried on the ambulance. This decreases liability associated with providing prehospital emergency medical services by ensuring that everything needed to properly care for a patient is present and in good working order. Missing supplies, malfunctioning equipment, and expired drugs represent sources of liability, especially if they result in improper patient care. The Occupational Safety and Health Administration and US Department of Health and Human Services do not require EMS services to complete an equipment/supply checklist. Finally, insurance agencies do not require the submission of the equipment/supply checklists in order to provide ongoing liability coverage for the service.
